

Outreach: Building New and Enhancing Current Community Partnerships –

Social-Emotional Health:

- · Question Persuade Refer (QPR) suicide intervention skills training
 - Youth QPR Monica, Alex, and several other local facilitators taught all 9th grade students at Lincoln and Melrose-Mindoro High Schools in November.
 - O QPR for the Faith Community Alex taught QPR at a regional meeting of Evangelical Lutheran pastors in November. He will teach a second workshop for local pastors in early December. Meals for both were provided by a grant obtained by Pastor Eric Bakken.
- Mindfulness-enhanced Strengthening Families Program Monica and Alex are successfully wrapping up a 7-week program. In the coming year, Jackson County will be part of a larger pilot project supported by grant funding obtained at the state level.

Transitions:

- Northwoods Coalition (NWC) membership The NWC is a coalition of coalitions supported by Marshfield Clinic. Our involvement helps bring resources into Jackson County, including research and evidence-based strategies, funding (about \$2000-3000 annually), and a network of health and youth risk prevention educators and specialists. Monica has taken over membership responsibilities for our Jackson County connection to the NWC.
- Social Marketing Campaign The campaign, which targets females ages 14-18 to encourage healthy coping skills, is on-going through the end of July 2019, pre-paid through Healthier Wisconsin Partnership Program funds (this grant is ending December 31, 2018). Monica will be the local contact for the ad agency responsible for the project.
- Contracted Staff Together for Jackson County Kids (TFJCK) is losing Alex (0.5FTE) and Lisa (1.0FTE) at the end of December. The coalition has enough funds to support another 0.5FTE contracted position and has been working to identify a contractor willing to take on limited coordination responsibilities for the coalition. Leadership Team members conducted interviews at the end of November. Monica will be lead supervisor for the position, which will likely be housed at UW-Extension in the future.

4-H HIGHLIGHTS

4-H Achievement Celebration – This took place on Sunday, November 4th from 12 PM to 2 PM at the Skyline Golf Course. This is the annual 4-H banquet that is done every year to recognize the work that 4-H youth, leaders, and volunteers put forth during the year. It is meant to be fun, and full of recognition. This year the theme and focus of the celebration was on being grateful and thankful. The Black River Falls Trailblazers 4-H Club was the group who helped with the planning of the event, along with two key volunteers.

- Anticipated attendance was a maximum of 75 people. We ended up having 103 people RSVP, and 136 people attend the event. It was a GREAT turn-out and the people at Skyline did a great job of accommodating our extra people!
- We had 4-H youth from the BRF Trailblazers 4-H club assist with reading the awards
- The Parent and Leaders Board wanted to get feedback from 4-H youth and adults of what 4-H fundraiser they would like to do in the upcoming year.
 - We had a total of 64 people participate in voting for the fundraiser they would like to see, and participate in, for Jackson County!
 - There were four different options for people to vote on: Savers Event, 4-H Cookbook, Plat books, and Ashley for the Arts Event. The 4-H Cook book was the main fundraiser that people were interested in, with plat books coming in second.
- There were a total of 22 thank you cards written and submitted back to the basket for us to mail out. All were addressed by the 4-H Program Coordinator on Monday, November 5, 2018 and placed in the mailbox so the recipients would be able to see how thankful the 4-H youth and parents are for all the support the recipients provide.
- Nominations for the Parent and Leaders Board were held through paper ballots found at the entry of the event. We received four nominations from individuals who others think would be great on the Parent and Leaders Board
- This year we displayed all of the completed and judged record books on two tables at the entry of the event. We left pens and post-it notes spread out about the tables. The goal was that people would leave positive notes on the youths completed record books. Overall we would have LOVED to see more people write positive messages, but the youth that did get messages on their books were VERY excited and happy about the notes of positivity!
- This year we had a photo booth set up at the event for people to take individual, club, family, and friend pictures at! We used an i-pad to take the photos and an app called 'Simple Booth' and people seemed to enjoy it. We plan to continue this in the
